Overview of the Prevent Blindness America Preschool Vision Screening Certification Program:

Prevent Blindness America is the only organization offering a national certification program for pediatric vision screening and vision screening training. We work to assure that children's vision is being screened with techniques based on current research.

Protocols for certification are based on the recommendations of its Pediatric Vision Advisory Committee, which is composed of a diverse group of leading experts in child health and vision care from across the country, including ophthalmologists, optometrists, pediatricians, public health strategists, and vision and eye health researchers. Prevent Blindness America regularly reviews and updates its pediatric vision screening, training and follow up protocols to ensure they are aligned with the most recently scientifically validated approaches, embrace a public health philosophy and promote the full continuum of care.

Vision Screening certification assures that evidence-based science and expert consensus result in standardized vision screening methods that are cost-effective in sight conservation. Minimum protocols must be strictly followed in order to maintain certification. If a program does not meet the minimum standards, it can no longer be referred to as a Prevent Blindness America-certified screening.

Prevent Blindness America's approved vision screening protocol is aligned with those of the Ohio Department of Health and the American Academy of Pediatrics vision screening standards. The training includes distance visual acuity testing and stereopsis testing using approved tools, as well as observation of the child and the child's eyes. Additionally, a critical component of the screening is the referral for a comprehensive exam upon the suspicion of any potential problems, as well as appropriate follow-up with the child and the child's caregiver. The primary purpose of a vision screening is to educate consumers about the importance of regular professional eye exams and to find those at highest risk for vision problems and to facilitate follow up for professional care. A vision screening is not a substitute for a comprehensive eye exam.

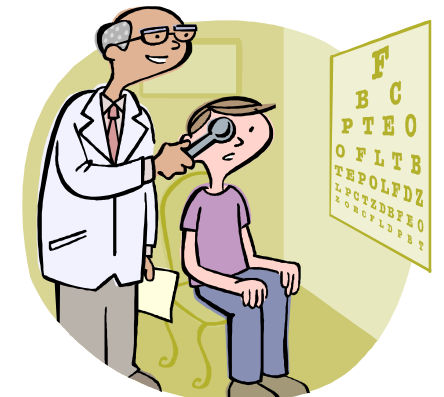
